

2018 was a remarkable year for the United Way of New York City, and an important one for our country, state, city and importantly women. Everywhere we looked more and more women felt empowered to become leaders on behalf of their communities. This groundswell of engagement has been both encouraging and invigorating.

I am encouraged because we can see very concretely, what happens when intelligent, persistent and creative women come together –

- In five years, students in a challenged community went from 9% of 3rd graders reading on grade level, to 43% significantly outperforming similar schools in their neighborhood and putting them on the path to future success.
- And in three years, almost 1,000 ReadNYC families and Mott Haven residents have accessed resources that include financial literacy, tax preparation, advocacy, academic workshops, and case management, and directly increased their financial resources by well over \$2.5 million.

I am invigorated because achievement of these results confirm that change is possible and fuels us to extend our reach.

The rewards of making our city a place where every child has an equal opportunity to scholastically succeed, and at the same time parents have the opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency is immeasurable. As I witness so many women stepping up to solve our immense challenges, once again, I am empowered to rise to the occasion.

As we cross into this eighth decade for United Way of New York City, I want to express how honored I am to be at the helm during a period where we have such resolute supporters from within and throughout the corporate, foundation and government communities.

Cheryl Wills Author, Award-winning Reporter and Anchor Spectrum News NY1

Cheryl Wills is a veteran anchor for Spectrum News NY1 - she joined the cable network during its launch in 1992 and this year she is celebrating her 25th anniversary with the national news team. She is the primetime anchor for NY1 Live at Ten and she's also the host of the public affairs talk show In Focus with Cheryl Wills. In 2018, Cheryl became the first African American reporter in NY1's history to win an Emmy Award.

The award-winning journalist is the author of three books about her great-great-great grandfather Sandy Wills who fought in The Civil War: "Die Free: A Heroic Family Tale," an illustrated children's book "The Emancipation of Grandpa Sandy Wills" and a YA book "Emancipated: My Family's Fight/or Freedom." Cheryl has been invited to do readings of her Emancipation Series to tens of thousands of students across the country.

Cheryl has interviewed some of the most powerful people in the world including the first woman president of Africa: Ellen Johnson Sirleaf of Liberia. Cheryl's groundbreaking report earned her a prestigious medal from United Nations Correspondents Association. She also scored an exclusive interview with United Nations Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon. Cheryl's personal favorite was going one-on-one with the late great writer and activist Maya Angelou.

In March of 2018, Cheryl was honored with the prestigious Commander's Medal from the U.S. Department of the Army: The Public Service Commendation Medal is the fourth highest public service decoration the United States Department of the Army can bestow upon a civilian.

Cheryl has also received awards from The New York Press Club, The Newswomen's Club of NY Front Page Award, and The Associated Press. In 2017, The Association of Social Studies Teachers I UFT awarded Cheryl Wills The Rosa Parks Award for Social Justice for "illuminating the struggle for Black equality from The Civil War to present." In 2017, Cheryl also received the Dr. Martin Luther King Award from three prominent Jewish organizations at The Israeli Consulate for bridging the gap between African Americans and Jews.

Tonya T. Robinson *General Counsel*KPMG

Tonya Robinson joined KPMG LLP as its General Counsel in 2017. Previously, Tonya served as the Acting General Counsel at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), working as legal advisor to the Secretary and as principal-in-charge of nearly 600 professionals in HUD's Headquarters, 10 Regional Offices, and 40 Field Offices. Prior, Tonya served as HUD's Principal Deputy General Counsel and, earlier, as Special Assistant to the President for Justice and Regulatory Policy in the White House. She also convened President Obama's National Equal Pay Task Force; co-chaired an interagency working group charged with addressing employment opportunities for previously incarcerated individuals; co-chaired an interagency roundtable focused on leveraging civil legal services to promote access to housing, education, employment, healthcare, and other outcomes; and co-convened the White House Interagency Policy Committee on Human Trafficking.

Before her service at the White House, Tonya was a partner at the international law firm WilmerHale LLP, where her portfolio included a mix of complex commercial litigation, Congressional investigations, and discrete civil rights matters. Indeed, as a young associate, Tonya worked on the groundbreaking University of Michigan affirmative action cases, Grutter v. Bollinger and Gratz v. Bollinger. Tonya left Wilmer for a few years in 2001 to work as counsel to then-Senator Joseph R. Biden, Jr. on the U.S. Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime and Drugs – her fourth stint on Capitol Hill – and returned to the firm in 2004.

Tonya received her B.A. in Public Policy Studies and a Certificate in Women's Studies from Duke University. She earned a post-graduate degree in African Studies from the University of Cape Town in South Africa, as a Rotary International Ambassadorial Scholar, and her J.D. from Harvard Law School. Upon graduation from Harvard, Tonya served as a judicial clerk for the Honorable Francis D. Murnaghan, Jr. on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit.
